Criteria Used to Determine Oswego County, New York World War 1 Casualties (2018)

The casualty criteria used for Oswego County was based on having been born or resided in the county, or at the time of death from any cause, a parent or spouse were residing in the county. The time period under consideration was the date of induction into military service, to March 11, 1919. We extended the time period beyond the ending of the war, signing of the Armistice ending hostilities on November 11, 1918 by 120 days to account for any factors (e.g. wounds, infections, disease) which may have contributed to one's death beyond the Armistice.

*NOTE: In many instances, more than one and often several sources were needed to determine whether the individual met the criteria established for being listed as a World War 1 Casualty from Oswego County, New York. Two earlier versions of this list were provided to town and city historians throughout Oswego County for their review, edits, and corrections, based on supporting documentation. This list was distributed to the local historians in April, 2018 for final review and comment. As of May 23, 2018, no corrections or additions have been made.

Footnotes:

The research process included the distribution of an initial and two subsequently revised casualty listing to city and town historians in Oswego County for review and suggested changes and additions, based on information they had in support of such changes. As a result of this process, corrections and additions were made to the casualty listing, thus making this commemorative initiative a collective, countywide effort.

Based on the criteria employed, the names of the individuals in this report represent what is considered an accurate listing of Oswego County World War 1 Casualties, with the understanding we may have missed someone, which is unfortunate, but a real possibility when looking back 100 years.

On November 11, 2018, the 100th Anniversary of the signing of the Armistice ending hostile actions, a plaque listing Oswego County's World War 1 fallen will be dedicated at the Oswego County Veterans Memorial Park in Oswego, New York.
